It also considers the special problems that broadcasters have with libel suits and their potentially inhibiting effect on television news coverage. Labunski traces the development of libel law largely from 1964, when the Supreme Court entered the libel arena for the first time and began a twenty-year effort to develop standards that are fair to both sides. He describes the hostile environment which journalists must enter when they defend themselves in court. He also demonstrates the complexity and inconsistency that have resulted from the state-by-state creation of libel standards. Labunski offers

suggestions, some more easily accomplished than others, that will help us get out of the libel "morass" which twenty years of Supreme Court activity and lower court litigation have produced. This book will be of particular value to students of the First Amendment, communication scholars, working journalists, and anyone who wants to better understand the complex development of libel laws and the effect of libel suits on news coverage.
