In 1935 werd Ernst Gombrich, een toen 26-jarige doctor in de kunstgeschiedenis zonder uitzicht op een vaste aanstelling, door een kennis uit de uitgeverijwereld gevraagd of hij een wereldgeschiedenis voor een jeugdig publiek zou kunnen schrijven. Na niet meer dan zes weken had Gombrich de opdracht voltooid, en *Eine kurze Weltgeschichte für junge Leser*, uitgegeven in Wenen, werd direct een succes in de Duitstalige landen.
