

Leonard Rubank Selected Studies For Cornet Or Trumpet

Fine bassoon teachers are a rarity in all but cities with major symphony orchestras and/or a university with a distinguished music department faculty. William Spencer took up the challenge of providing material for the serious bassoonist with *The Art of Bassoon Playing*, published in 1958.
