

## Who Were The Three Stooges Who Was

Provides information about the Stooges' lives and careers, including photographs, interviews, and filmography.

Paul "Mousie" Garner's career as a stooge (a "fall guy" or "assistant" to the head clown) began in vaudeville, when he and his partner were firing off jokes and one-liners, as well as leaping over oil-drums. Another part of the act, which could run as often as five times a day, involved Garner getting smashed over the head with plastic ukuleles. Garner's big break came when, across town, funnyman Ted Healy parted ways with his sidekicks, who went on to greater fame as The Three Stooges. Garner was then hired as a replacement stooge-and soon learned that Healy, unlike other slapstick comedians, actually slapped his partners in the face instead of just pretending. Thus was Garner given his first real lesson in the fine arts of stooging, which demanded quick reflexes and perfect timing. In fact, it was Healy who came up with the nickname "Mousie" because Garner was always so jumpy, nervous and quick. Needless to say the name stuck; and Mousie Garner would go on to form "The Rollicking Mousie Garner Trio," join the touring "New Stooges," and work steadily in radio, television, theater, clubs and movies.

In April of 2003, CBS aired a program celebrating the 75th Anniversary of the Three Stooges. The program was very informative and was aired after prime time because even now, the decisionmakers - Jews themselves - knew that what these men was doing was incredibly violent and dangerous. Personally, I enjoyed watching their antics and any other program that shows white people dogging out other whites - the same way they got gut laughs off of Amos n' Andy, Stepin Fetchit, Mantan Moreland, "Good Times," "The Jeffersons" and other coons and the movies and TV shows they starred in. At any rate, the accolades, kudos and praise showered upon Moe, Larry, Curly Joe, Shemp and Joe should be counter-balanced - and in some cases augmented - with a black perspective. For the most part, the Stooges were talented, though racist; they were pioneers in comedy, but still sexist (some would say outright misogynistic). In other words, their skits were a reflection and reinforcement of the times. Much of the snippets about each Stooges episode and information outlining each segment was found on line, as a few people took the time to document the TV "shorts" and a few even bothered to provide a short overview of them. Some of this information was gleaned through research on-line, including a document called The Three Stooges Scrapbook. The topics they tackled, the fact that they were a reflection of their times (rampant sexism, racism and class issues permeate their work), are all important to me and as a result, this is more than just a puff piece; it is an anthropological and critical race theory look at these funny men, addressing issues and concerns that the reader may not find all that "funny." They had sibling issues just like the rest of us. Shemp was Curly's big brother and Curly replaced him for a while. But in 1946 Curly suffered a stroke and Shemp returned to the team. Some might say this is a waste of time. But any time spend studying something and analyzing it from a perspective that can help black and other minority kids learn how to "critically think," is never time wasted. The fact is, someone has to document or provide a black view of what these five Jews (Moe, Joe, Shemp, Larry and Curly) did in the name of "laughs" so that future generations won't be naively believing that it was all "innocent fun." They were, to put it mildly, a reflection of the times. Furthermore, there were 190 episodes, all told. That is a track record of almost two full decades of slaps, kicks, pokes and so on. They are to be commended for their stick-to-it-tiveness. In my brief reviews I highlight the jokes and laughs, but also point to issues of racism and gender bias when and wherever necessary. And we can't overlook the sadism masked in slapstick and silliness. This content analysis is the product of a great deal of television viewing. The inspiration to undertake this project started in 2002 when a cable television channel, A&E, aired an hour of Stooges movies and shorts. I watched nearly every Stooge movie made during the year or so, and documented the dates of each viewing. Many of them had repetitive themes and, in fact, I have categorized those which are similar (female gold diggers, haunted houses, the stooges as repairmen, etc.). The genius of these men should not be undermined, however. The sound effects of the pokes in the eyes were the plucking of strings on a ukelele; the slaps were oftentimes real with sounds effects magnifying them; the blows to the gut came from a bass drum; Larry's hair being ripped out was paper being torn, etc. etc. Their comedy was far more than just slapstick however; keenly honed puns and jokes placed the Stooges in a league far ahead of their time, in my view. And as I stated earlier, the outright sadism cannot be overstated.

In this paparazzi-inundated world, it's hard to imagine that there was a time when genuine movie stars were accessible to members of the public. That was certainly the case in the 1970s with surviving members of the Three Stooges comedy team. Moe Howard, Larry Fine, Curly-Joe DeRita and Joe Besser routinely corresponded with their young admirers, invited them into their homes, and forged genuine friendships. Stooges Among Us is a record of these unique relationships told in the words of the fans themselves. Also sharing their insights are Stooges' family members, colleagues and close personal friends. Leonard Maltin, the renowned film critic and historian, provides the foreword to this often candid, always affectionate tribute. The Three Stooges had several lineups over the decades, but two of them are most closely associated with the act. Two of the Howard brothers, Moe and Shemp, had their origins in 1920s vaudeville along with Larry Fine, but after Shemp quit, he was replaced by his younger brother Curly. Moe, Larry and Curly quickly became a hit in comedy shorts on screen, and even as other similar acts like Abbot & Costello went on to make full length films, the Stooges continued to star in shorts, producing the iconic scenes that everyone associates with them, from Larry asking what he did wrong to Moe trying to hit Curly and Curly's efforts to block him. Whether the boys were inept plumbers in *A Plumbing We Will Go* or unable to become gentlemen in *The Hoi Polloi*, the routine usually revolved around their humorously incompetent performances in every conceivable walk of life, with each setting making the act feel fresh even though viewers knew what was likely to happen in each circumstance. Although the Stooges were at their peak in the 1930s and early 1940s, the act continued almost right up until the death of Moe, the last one left. Curly, widely considered the most popular Stooge, had suffered a debilitating stroke that left him unable to perform after 1946, and Shemp returned until his death in 1955. Moe and Larry carried on with other teammates, including a "Fake Shemp" and Curly Joe, but no matter how often they tried to recapture the magic of the old lineups, the Stooges' heyday was over, at least when it came to original material. All told, their career spanned over 200 films, a heavy majority of which were shorts. However, with their older stuff constantly being televised, they have remained popular with new generations, and they are still watched and remembered fondly by people of all ages. As author Ted Okuda put it, "Their humor was the most undistilled form of low comedy; they were not great innovators, but as quick laugh practitioners, they place second to none. If public taste is any criterion, the Stooges have been the reigning kings of comedy for over fifty years." *American Legends: The Three Stooges* examines the lives and careers of America's most famous comedy team. By the 1920s, English comic Stan Laurel had been in dozens of films and American Oliver Hardy had appeared in hundreds, but it was not until they formed a duo together in 1926 that they began to truly be noticed. Once they did, however, Laurel & Hardy became one of the most famous comedy teams in American history, with a career that spanned 4 decades and included over 100 combined shorts and feature films. Even today, nearly 60 years after their last performances together, Laurel & Hardy are still popular, alongside legends like The Three Stooges and Abbott & Costello, and their routines are still watched across the globe. Ironically, one of America's most famous comedy duos, and the performers of the country's most famous skit, came together in part because Lou Costello had already failed to cut it in the film industry. In fact, Costello had appeared in a Laurel & Hardy film in 1927 before meeting his partner, Bud Abbott, on the burlesque circuit in New York City. In fact, the two first performed together in 1935 only because Abbott filled in for Costello's usual partner, who happened to be ill one fateful day. Over time, Abbott & Costello perfected their routine, which typically consisted of Abbott playing the straight man while his dimwit partner acted foolishly and interrupted his plans. It was a shtick that also did well on radio, albeit one that required Costello to modify his voice with a higher pitch that not only differentiated him from Abbott but also made him sound appropriately dumber. By 1940, they were not only successful on the radio but also among America's most popular movie stars, a status they held almost consistently throughout the decade and into the early 1950s. Working as "Martin and Lewis," the team of Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis became the most popular nightclub act in America, commanding huge fees for their appearances all across the country. Perhaps the most ironic aspect of their success is that Dean Martin was not a comedian in any real sense of the word, and even during their act, he essentially served as the straight man to Jerry Lewis. The routine ensured that critics took more notice of Jerry Lewis, who intentionally came across as an awkward figure with a brand of bodily humor that was borrowed from a lineage of Yiddish humor predicated on physical slapstick. And just as Martin benefited from Lewis' comedic skills, Lewis also further developed a singing career thanks to the more famous Martin's crooning. Though it's often forgotten now, the duo eventually broke up in the mid-1950s because Lewis was starting to outshine Martin in their joint film career.

While the Three Stooges were the longest active and most productive comedy team in Hollywood, their artistic height coincided with the years Curly was with them, from 1932 to 1946. Famous for his high-pitched voice, his "nyuk-nyuk-nyuk" and "why, soitenly," and his astonishing athleticism, Curly was a true natural, an untrained actor with a knack for improvisation. Yet for decades, little information about him was available. Then, in 1985, Joan Howard Maurer, the daughter of Moe Howard and the niece of Curly and Shemp, published this definitive biography. In addition to speaking at length with his relatives, friends, and colleagues, she amassed a wealth of Curly memorabilia, a mixture of written material and rare photographs of Curly's family, films, and personal life. In Curly, she put it all together to come up with the first and only in-depth look at this crazy comedic genius. She included plenty of intimate details about his astonishing relationship with his mother, his three marriages, and his interactions with his daughters and friends. The result was a well-rounded portrait of the most unpredictable—and most popular—Stooge. Joan Howard Maurer is the daughter of Moe Howard, the leader of the Three Stooges. The Stooges have come to be considered one of the most important rock bands, especially in regard to the formation of punk. By emphasizing their influence on later developments, however, critics tend to overlook the significance of the band in their own context and era. *The Music and Noise of the Stooges, 1967-71* addresses such oversights. Utilizing the lenses of cultural criticism and sound studies (drawing on the thinking of Theodor Adorno, Jacques Attali, and Pierre Bourdieu, among others), as well as contemporary and archival texts, this extensively researched study analyzes the trajectory and musical output of the original Stooges.
